EFRAH, At a glance

EFRAH is an NGO started in 1997 and came into legal existence in 1999 with an aim to build a society based on promoting socio-economic justice, social sensitivity, and empowering deprived groups in a manner that they become self-reliant and work collectively for social change. The core area of EFRAH intervention is Education (Facilitating children through learning centers & Vocational Training centers, mainstreaming those children with school, Advocating the Right to Education Act implementation and the importance of social & financial education), Livelihood (Self Help Group formation, Micro Finance & placement of students capacitated through vocational training), Health (RCH Awareness & HIV/AIDS prevention among female sex workers and migrant labors), WASH (Water Hardware Installation and Sanitation & Hygiene programme), Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) (Awareness and increased coping capacity to shocks induced to disaster) are another area of intervention and Rights (Advocacy for Child Rights, domestic violence and sexual harassment-related to Adolescent girls/Women).

One of our important focuses is institutional arrangements in self-help collectives and their skill-building while creating a shared vision for change. While creating a shared vision, the community shares a holistic approach towards development that includes improved health service access by women and children in particular, child protection and rights that includes girl's child education and gender violence issues, financial inclusion has been ensured of families through mainstream financial institutions as a graduation criterion for withdrawal by EFRAH.

Vision

Theory of Change

If families living in poverty are mobilized in collectives and their knowledge/information access and skills are enhanced, including acquiring new skills, their ability to access resources gets enhanced i.e., to take up improved practice or take new livelihood initiatives, market exposures, and then they are able to impact on poverty.

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Education

Education is not only about making a livelihood; education is also about making a living. It has been a decade of a meaningful journey since EFRAH began its mission convincingly with the tool of education for children.

The belief has been that if we provide the underprivileged children with the gift of education, they would make a life of dignity. Managing to stay healthy is a challenge in the communities, thanks to inadequate health-seeking behavior, lack of access to healthcare, and issue of affordability.

The mission for the year ahead is going to be to apply this intensive learning in the rural outreach of the country to the extent best possible. Thanks to the encouragement towards each of the subject areas as well as the Integrated Community Development model during the year, we can gear up to make this mission a reality in the outreach.

Healthcare

"He who has health has hope, and he who has hope has everything". EFRAH & healthcare initiatives are inspired by the community to support their peers, that is the primary reason why EFRAH focuses on providing comprehensive and contemporary healthcare services and facilities to the underprivileged. The urban outreach and slums in the target areas still have severe difficulties in accessing even the most basic yet critical medical services, because of various reasons – nearest affordable medical facilities mostly being located at far-off distances; lack of awareness; poor financial conditions; etc. As the result, people still lose their lives to preventable and completely curable diseases like tuberculosis, diarrhoea, malaria, cholera etc.

The Targeted Intervention (TI) Program is in progress under EFRAH supervision in which 1857 Female Sex Workers (FSW) were approached by outreach throughout the year. A two-way method is adopted to cover unserved/ underserved areas for sex workers and provide information on the control and prevention of HIV/AIDS amongst the target population. 6151 FSWs visited and got treated for STIs. Among those, 2708 FSW agreed and tested for HIV/AIDS. EFRAH facilitates treatment options for STIs, the availability of condoms for safer behavior during sexual interaction to reduce new infections, and provides comprehensive care, support, and treatment to all.



With help from community stakeholders, EFRAH organized health camps to provide health care services to the marginalized communities in the unauthorized colonies and slums. The stakeholders include DSACS, the health department, and specialist doctors (Gynecologists, Pediatrics, and General Physicians). The community mobilization is conducted extensively in and around the community through IEC materials, pamphlet distribution, announcements, and posters resulting in a high turnover of patients during camp hours. The smile health camp includes Women & Child Health, ANC & PNC Services, Awareness Session with Women, Child Health, STI/RTI treatment, Free Medical Check-up, Test HIV, Referral for major Cases other such services and medicines are also provided. A wide range of above services was provided during two health camps for daily wagers, construction workers, and those from unorganized sectors south-eastern part of Delhi, and weekly OPD services were conducted exclusively

Livelihood

One of the biggest challenges that India faces even today after the country has made significant progress, is employment generation. While it is a challenge for all young people seeking jobs, it is certainly more difficult for the youth coming from the marginalized sections. Most boys and girls from the economically weaker sections of society manage to study up to the higher secondary level; some the above-average if not brilliant. However, despite being good at studies and having a strong desire to study further, they get restrained primarily due to the family's economic conditions. Pressed with economic necessities, some or all usually take up menial unprofessional, and non-progressive jobs on daily wages. But this invariably has a negative effect on their morale and mental states; moreover, Education loses its importance and value in the perceptions of these young boys and girls, who would be the future of the country.

EFRAH's vocational training programs were started to help the target groups from the marginalized communities which are youth and adolescent girls. The organization running the project for the young community to make them ready for jobs and upgrade their scaling efforts and personality development to support their families and ourselves.



Under Skills to Livelihood, EFRAH operates a Centralized Placement Cell that works with potential employers from different sectors to understand their needs, analyze them and create opportunities for students, both through campus and off-campus placements. The Placement Cell also organizes workshops on a range of topics covering professional development, communication skills, interview process, and career guidance. Our VT centers have tie-ups with more than 52 employers and companies that offer employment to the students. EFRAH's placement cell works in cooperation with programme teams and potential employers, in order to achieve a fair placement percentage.

Women and Girl Child Empowerment

The program has been by and largely conceptualized in accordance with the goals and objectives enshrined in the national policy for the empowerment of women and has been overall mandated to create processes and environment for women and adolescent girls at the grassroots to realize their optimum potential in all facets of societal living and situations. The program is specifically aimed at the realization of both individual and collective self-esteem and inner strength for marginalized and socially excluded women and adolescent girls through innovative community practices.

One of the most unique elements of the women's program is the Integrated Empowerment Approach that it works on. According to this approach, women and girls from the target communities are identified and trained to become Change Agents, who in turn get actively involved in implementing the various initiatives of the program, in their respective communities. This approach has been working successfully on two levels - one; implementation through people of the same community works better, because of the trust and relationship that already exists; and second, these Change Agents are walking examples of the development that comes through empowerment thus influencing more and more women and girls to get involved. The program health and empowerment-based approach is implemented through multiple innovative activities. These various activities are all implemented through the Change Agents and can mainly be categorized under: -

WASH- Safe Drinking Water and Sanitation

Water sanitation and hygiene challenges are a burning issue now a day all over India. There is a need to re-focus on stopping open defecation rather than the building of facilities alone, investing heavily in hygiene promotion and social intermediation, particularly at the household level, and providing improved and affordable design options for the poor. But there are huge numbers of families above the poverty line who does not have clean drinking water and don't follow adequate or any sanitation and hygiene practices. The project impacts overall health. In another hand providing adequate sanitation, the condition is due to a lack of trained personnel, lack of knowledge, and improper need-based area-specific planning to disseminate information and constantly monitor the changes. Keeping it in the mind and depending on the present situation this program aims and focused to be achieved only on developing collaboration with different stakeholders for convergence of funds and up-scaling of learning.

Mission Statement on Wash

Advocate and facilitate access to Safe Water, Tree Plantation, Sanitation, and Hygiene for everyone in need, everywhere, and always to impact malnutrition, maternal and child health in particular, and community health at large.

Objective

- Achieving open defecation-free (ODF) status in selected communities
- Access to round-the-year safe water in the intervention areas
- Promote school sanitation and hygiene activities to cover adolescent girls
- Strengthen women's representation in decision-making committees like the community water
- Community sanitation committee (CWSC) and at the slums level
- Strengthen social audit process to monitor quality and timeliness of government scheme deliverables.

Activities

- Involvement of Govt. Dept. for water and Sanitation and submitted DPR to the local authorities for slums water infrastructure in 14 slums
- People to be aware of safe hygiene practices (personal & Menstrual hygiene).
- ODEP plan and Open defecation-free community

- Clean Drive: Swachh Community campaign
- Exposure visits of Women committee to understand the applied mechanism of sanitation behavior.
- Support to CWSC for Technical Design of water distribution infrastructure
- Tree plantation awareness drive
- Rain Water harvesting awareness • Catch the Water campaign to improve water level etc.

Theory of change

If the community is mobilized and triggered this helps individuals and collective to change their behavior on water and hygiene practice outcome that helps generate demands and improve their ability to access resources and technology, this creates scope for improved access to potable water and sustainable hygiene infrastructure, then it creates sustained change in sanitation outcome that impacts on malnutrition, reduces new born and maternal deaths and also attributes to the economic enhancement of the households

Disaster Risk Reduction – COVID19

India's geo-climatic conditions, and its high degree of socio-economic vulnerability, make it one of the most disaster-prone countries in the world. It is highly vulnerable to floods, droughts, cyclones, earthquakes, landslides, avalanches, and forest fires. EFRAH in its pursuit of promoting strategic giving and supporting vulnerable communities has constructively engaged with donors, civil society, and government authorities to respond to disasters.

EFRAH in association with donor agencies working on Disaster Risk Reduction measures and hazard vulnerability capacity analysis in the schools and the community. It was, in fact, orientation and sensitization of school authorities, teaching and non-teaching staff, and students on evacuation maps indicating evacuation routes, resources, and safe assembly areas within school premises during any kind of disaster. The program content is designed for easy grasping to school students that include the school safety plan and signage route. The training module introduces to 41 schools of south Delhi in which Students, teaching/non-teaching staff, and some parents participated. The module consisted of general safety practice, geo-informatics system (GIS), and signage route according to the school building and floors, etc. are trained on the prescribed format.

COVID19 and Humanitarian Response

EFRAH is working on a Humanitarian response to COVID19 since the nationwide lockdown. We are closely working with District Administration, Police stations, Local Public representatives, Municipal corporations, Health officers, and local administration and have stepped in to provide relief by providing food and ration to thousands of stranded migrant workers, people, and women. By adhering to all safety and hygiene measures, EFRAH has begun its relief service by providing meals, dry rations, PPE kits, and masks. EFRAH during humanitarian response providing app. 303000 food packets of cooked meals, distributing 90000 masks, over 11000 sanitizer kits, 900 PPE kits, and 18500 dry ration kits were provided. Another initiative launched for community awareness by "Telephonic awareness on COVID-19 and steps to prevention" approx. 21000 people amid awareness through it. So far and still we are working with the same spirit to reach more and more vulnerable individuals or families. We are working with government authorities such as District Administration, South East Delhi, and G.B. Nagar. Daily we identified localities where people are hungry and helped us distribute the food there.

Women and Girls are affected because during lockdown women get, not regular wages and are equal to Men's. Girls are also affected because their educational institutions have closed at home and take the burden on their education results, their study what will happen in the future and also, they face domestic work pressure because most parents thought they have support because education institution had permanently closed.

EFRAH Team Members during COVID-19 are aware of the people about new laws set up Central Government from time to time. I also get the awareness about social distancing, wearing the mask, and washing hands many times a day. I also follow this at their home regularly.

These young dedicated volunteers not only score high with training centers students by bringing a more interactive approach to the classrooms but being of the same age group, are also able to understand better and resolve the various challenges that the students face. Innovative techniques, TLM and equipment etc. are use by these volunteers to increase student participation at the training centers. Mostly these volunteers help to enhance skills like communication, vocal, and interpersonal skills of the students. The volunteers consider this a two-way learning process, which also augments their own knowledge and skill.

Networking and Alliances

EFRAH establishes partnerships and builds networks with like-minded national, government, and foreign development agencies as well as educational institutions. These alliances are made with the primary objective to connect the domain expertise, resources, and strengths with EFRAH's own developmental initiatives. Along with expansion and strengthening of existing programs, EFRAH also focuses on bringing innovations to its enterprises through this association with developmental sectors. Many prominent development agencies, donor organizations, confederations, and associations across the country have joined hands with EFRAH to further its welfare initiatives.

These events and campaigns are implemented at both local and regional levels to ensure optimum penetration and reach. This year too, the focus was more on conducting events in tier I and II cities, while simultaneously continuing state-level activities. Some of the events and campaigns that were carried out this year are a month-long community awareness series on true stories of girls fighting extraordinary fights for their own rights and survival; EFRAH plans to continue reaching the maximum number of people and sensitize them.

IMPACT STORY

Heartily Thanks to EFRAH for generous support!

Ms. Roshani, who is 31 years old and comes from a low-income family, rents a home for her family of six in Sarita Vihar, C-block, New Delhi, 110076, and pays 1500 per month for it. She earns between INR 1500 and INR 2000 per month by thread cutting and stone pasting clothing pieces with her kids. This sum is insufficient to cover all of the family's expenses. Her husband makes between INR 4000 and 5000 per month working as a daily worker.

They are originally from Farrukhabad and moved to Delhi 15 years ago in search of a better way of life. Almost a decade has passed, but things are not turning out the way they expect. Since moving, the couple has been working together while battling for a better future.



Despite having no chance of finding employment once they return to work, both spouses have been out of a job since the lockdown caused by COVID-19. She started saving money for her daughters three years ago, but her efforts were cut short during the first lockdown. As a result, the family had to rely on the Delhi government's cooked meal programs as well as other resources like NGOs and some one-on-one help for food. In this crucial time EFRAH with support of action aid provided the Dry ration. So, she is heartily thanks to EFRAH and ActionAid.

"Changing Lives one at a Time" ON EVERY FACE

Mamta Kumari, 35, resides in the A block of Jaitapur Ext. II in New Delhi. She lived in a rented home with her husband, brother, and three children. Her husband, the only source of income for the family, sells BHEL Puris on the street and is able to make between INR 6,000 and 7,000 per month. Manita also contributes between INR 1500 and 1800 per month through her work as a thread cutter and stone paster, but because of the lockdown, the family's income has been reduced to zero, making it difficult to manage the family's expenses and the house's rent.



After a month of lockdown, the children's survival and nourishment were severely compromised, and the family faced starvation. The biggest issue is that they only occasionally receive this from charitable organizations and government-sponsored food programs. They also occasionally receive some financial support from local bodies. During the lockdown, dry rations are provided three times. Later on, we recommend her name to ActionAid India for financial support, and she receives INR 3500 to help with rent or other vital expenses.

She is currently enrolled in programmes operated by NIDAN, an NGO that collaborates with street vendors on the Micro Finance Working Initiative and sells semi-stitched, unstitched women's clothes priced between Rs. 150 and 500. The sellers must sell, and Nidan will receive whatever profits they make on the pieces they took and the base price. She is prospering and making some money from this.

IMPACT STORY

Thanks to EFRAH! for support the underprivileged community

Asha Devi, 58, has spent the previous 15 years residing in B1-69, JJ colony Madanpur Khadar. She is a migrant from Bihar, and her son and daughter-in-law died in a road accident in 2018. Since then, she has taken on all of the family's responsibilities, including caring for her husband's disability and her four grandchildren. She is the family's sole provider and a domestic worker.

Her grandchildren are too young for supporting her in family expenses. Her family makes a total of Rs. 7000 per month. Her family's income has stopped because to the COVID-19 Delhi Lockdown, and all of their savings have been used to combat the pandemic.



Now since there are no food products in her home, they are having a lot of difficulties. She has no money at all. She claims that she is unable to work outside the home and that she is jobless. Because her owner forbids her from leaving for work due to COVID-19, she has been extremely concerned about her family and how they will be able to obtain food during this pandemic.

In this situation, EFRAH gives her a dry ration kit, and she would like to express her gratitude to APPI for doing so. She no longer has a significant food problem thanks to the dry ration package.



She informed us that the food will last for 15 to 17 days. However, if the lockdown is prolonged, she is concerned about the next days and how she will receive food. She is grateful to APPI for helping her through this difficult time during COVID-19.
